

IMPORTANCE OF PRIMARY TEACHERS

Standards and values give a child security. They strengthen a child's identity as a child of God and kindle in the child's heart hope- he beginning of a testimony.

We want to be able to share in the joy of being able to teach Heavenly Fathers children. We ask that when you are preparing your weekly lesson to teach your class, that you do

it with prayer and study. We find and have seen that when teachers rush to plan a lesson on Saturday night and in a hurry, that they often get frustrated and overwhelmed. How can we teach gospel principles with these feelings? If at all possible, please plan your lessons in advance and allow the spirit to guide you. You will be blessed for your efforts! This will also help us, as a Presidency, and you, teachers, to be prepared for Primary and be able to show up on time and set the example for the children. This directly correlates with filling out your library request forms in advance as well.



Teachers:

Determining if Class Members are

Learning

A teacher is not teaching unless class members are learning. How can you know if learning is taking place? The careful teacher will wish to evaluate learning as each lesson progresses, at the end of the lessons, and outside the classroom.

EVALUATING LEARNING IN PROGRESS

An excellent way to measure class learning is to keep the class constantly and actively involved in the lesson. When the class is doing much of the talking, the teacher can tell if they are just

listening, if they are listening with understanding, and if they are beginning to apply what they learn. It is difficult to know what is happening in the mind of a silent class member. To keep the class members responding-

- 1. Ask questions
- 2. Play a game using the information presented in the lesson
- 3. Have them bring their scriptures and read aloud at your request or follow along as others read
- 4. Have them summarize during the lesson, not just at the end
- 5. Help them share their feelings during and/or at the end of the lesson
- 6. Sing a song about the lesson idea
- 7. Use a worksheet with answers to be filled in as the lesson progresses
- 8. Give a test of some sort to measure knowledge. A test may be written or be given orally.
- 9. Use buzz groups or buddy sessions
- 10. Have them repeat things back to you
- 11. Have them share lesson-related experiences

Other indicators which you should watch for as the lesson progresses:

- 1. Are they watching you carefully?
- 2. Do they seem to be listening?
- 3. Are they getting fidgety?
- 4. Are they nodding or appearing to agree?

- 5. Are they nodding or appearing to sleep?
- 6. Do they seem eager to answer questions and participate?
- 7. Are they talking among themselves?
- 8. Are they following along in their scriptures?
- 9. Can you feel the spirit?

If the answers to 1, 2, 4, 6, 8, and 9 are yes, chances are that learning is going on. If the answers to those are no and to 3, 5, and 7 are yes, then changes might need to be made.

EVALUATING LEARNING at THE END OF LESSONS

- 1. Ask questions
- 2. Have class members summarize
- 3. Play a game, using information taught in the lesson
- 4. Help them share their feelings and experiences
- 5. Have class members complete the sentence "Today I learned....." or "Because of today's lesson I...."
- 6. Give a short written quiz

EVALUATING LEARNING FROM PREVIOUS LESSONS

- 1. Observe class members outside the class
- 2. Consult with class members or parents
- 3. Have class members report on how they have been able to apply what they learned in previous lessons
- 4. Have class members keep records of their progress with lesson goals
- 5. Consult other teachers of the same group
- 6. Have class members write briefly on a previous lesson topic
- 7. Have them sing a song they have learned in a previous lesson
- 8. Have them cite scriptures used in previous lessons
- 9. Have them perform any specific skill previously taught, such as how to figure out how much tithing would be owed on a given amount of money.
- 10. Interview individual class members




Dear Primary teacher,


As you are aware, many problems can arise in teaching a group of young children. We have devised a way for you to deal with these problems without even having to open your classroom door.


The Primary Presidency





As a Primary Presidency, we want to emphasize that each child is a special spirit of God. We encourage you to pray for each of your primary children. Be attentive to their behavior in class so that you may best assist them in their spiritual development. Make an effort to seek out the less active children. This is your responsibility as their teacher. Call them at home and extend that personal invitation to church. Your primary class needs to know that you are there specifically for their spiritual welfare.

Ple ase be aware of things going on in their lives that might need assistance. If there is a child missing from your class or you know of circumstances that need attending to, please inform one of the Presidency immediately so that we may extend service where needed as well. We need to make sure that Heavenly Fathers' children know that we love them and need their spirits in Primary. Thanks for all your service to these precious spirits!



An Example Problem and Solution

OUR PROBLEM:

A large class with short attention spans. A frustrated teacher trying to get a large group of 10 and 11 year olds to participate and stay focused in class.

OUR SOLUTION:

After much prayerful consideration and discussion with the teacher, we came up with the following solution.— Each child was given (the teacher purchased) a spiral notebook and pen. During a Sunday lesson, each child embellished their notebook to make it personal. This task kept them reverent and focused while the lesson was taught. It also made the notebook THEIRS. The now had a CHURCH JOURNAL to record any of their thoughts and feelings concerning the lesson or their reading assignment.

Each child is encouraged to write at least one thing down they learned or felt during the lesson. The teacher often points out the main objective of the lesson and encourages them to at least put that in their journal. Amazingly, so much more seems to get into the pages of their journal, proving that they are learning and retaining!

The children understand that the teacher will periodically look through their journals. They are kept at the church and pulled out each Sunday. On occasion the teacher has used the journals to write special notes of thank-you and encouragement to their students.

Did it work? Just an example— one boy, at the beginning of this "experiment" simply wrote down "17" in block lettering. What a blessing to know that this young boy— age 10— was able to know that young boys can have their prayers answered— just like Joseph Smith! Other examples: most of the books contain drawings of Lehi's dream, as well as Scripture references used in each lesson, steps to repentance, definitions of covenants....so much more.


